Pastor's Page

A Matter of Life & Death

Religion is about our deepest convictions. I remember it well--sitting in a doctoral seminar in anthropology of religion at Northwestern University. Renowned British anthropologist Mary Douglas was leading our rather intimate gathering of ten or so graduate students. Our discussion that day revolved around one question: When reduced to its core, what is the essence of religion? In other words, what is the very heart of religion; what is it essentially? I'll never forget Professor Douglas's perspective. She said, in effect, religion is about our deepest beliefs and values, our core convictions. It is about that which concerns us most. Religion is literally a matter of life and death—of life overcoming death!

Mark's story of Jesus was the earliest of our four Gospels. From the get-go, we're told what Mark's story is all about: "The beginning of the good news about Jesus the Messiah." Matthew fleshes out in more detail what this good news is. The first time Jesus preaches in Matthew's Gospel, he quotes the prophet Isaiah declaring that "the people living in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the shadow of death a light has dawned. From that time on Jesus began to preach, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." Do you see it? Do I see it? Darkness and light are juxtaposed with death and life! A few chapters later, when John the Baptist's disciples ask Jesus whether he is the Messiah, or should they look for another, Jesus replies, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the poor have good news preached to them and the dead are raised to life!"

In the person of Jesus, the kingdom of God is breaking into the world. And wherever God's kingdom breaks into the world, the forces of death are overcome by the forces of life: evil is overcome by good; sickness in its myriad forms is overcome by healing; hunger and poverty are replaced with food and prosperity; the burden of ignorance is overcome by knowledge and truth that sets us free; broken relationships are mended; and the darkness is overcome by the light of Christ. Above all, in Jesus, God has responded to the deepest and final need of humankind—the threat of death itself.

On the day we call Good Friday, it seemed as though the forces of evil, darkness, and death had won the day. Oh, no. Three days later Sunday arrived. And early that morning God raised Jesus from death to life. Oh, yes! Easter is all about resurrection and celebrating God's victory of life over death. And so our faith in Jesus Christ is a matter of life and death...of life overcoming death. Hallelujah, UMC-Geneva! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!

God calls us to put our faith in God's unending love and grace - something that will never go away, and will sustain us through the times when others have abandoned us. Pastor Rich preaches, "Giving Up Popularity."

April 18 Maundy Thursday 7:30 p.m.

Please join us for a meaningful Tenebrae worship service of scriptures, prayer, music and extinguishing of candles preparing us for the darkness of Good Friday. The increasing darkness symbolizes the approaching darkness of Jesus' death and hopelessness in the world without God.

April 19 Good Friday 7:30 p.m.

Pastor Esther will lead a traditional worship service on this night when we remember the story of Jesus' betrayal, suffering, abandonment, and death. Jesus' intentional, self-sacrificing love confronts and overcomes the depth of human cruelty, offering reconciliation with God.





Observing Holy Week and Easter by Jim Byrne

Holy Week begins with Palm or Passion Sunday, when we celebrate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem as he is praised by crowds who place palm branches on the road in front of him. Many people like to bring their palm frond home and display it.

Maundy or Holy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper, the first Eucharist, often symbolized by a foot washing service. It is also a day when we remember Peter's betrayal and denial of his association with Jesus. Maundy recalls the new commandment (*mandatum novum* in Latin) in John 13:34.

Good Friday is regarded by many as the darkest day in the church calendar, the day when Christ was tried and convicted, beaten, crucified, and buried. So why is it called "good"? It may have been called *God's Friday* at one time, and it shows that God was working to draw the world to God's self in Christ. We also call it *good* as we look through the lens of Easter.

Holy Saturday services or vigil may be offered, and are generally simple and solemn.

Easter Day, the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, is the first day of a new season in the church calendar. The Easter Season lasts 50 days and ends on Pentecost (50th). It represents the time during which Jesus returns to his followers and begins a new phase of his ministry as the Christian church is established. In what ways can you plan to celebrate these specials days and seasons?

EARTH DAY - APRIL 22

Missions and Church in Society Update

Meeting church budget by the end of 2018 has given the Missions and Church in Society committees the exciting privilege of being able to contribute financially to the work of our local, national, and global mission partners on behalf of our congregation. Our joint committees are dedicated to prayerfully researching and maintaining communication with these various ministries to make the best decisions for how our tithe is distributed. UMCG has a reputation of being a generous, caring congregation making an impact in the Fox Valley community and around the world through our monetary gifts and service. This past year we continued that tradition once again, maintaining our status as a Rainbow Covenant church fully meeting our apportionments in the greater United Methodist Church.

Of the 5% tithe from the overall church budget, the Mission committee is responsible for disbursement of 66% and Church in Society 34%.

From the 2018 operating budget tithe, Missions received and gave \$24,000.
