Looking for Signs

As I write this column half-way through December, we've almost made it through the *Hallmark* Christmas movie season on TV. I've been watching these movies with my wife over the past few years—in spite of the fact that the plots of these nostalgic, romantic movies are at best rather thin. (I must admit, I can't help asking early on in each movie questions like, "Hmm, I wonder if *she's* going to fall in love with *him* before this movie's over?")

One *Hallmark* movie that sticks out in my mind this year was titled "A Godwink Christmas." I had never heard the term "Godwink," but have been familiar with the term "Godcidence." Essentially, the two terms are the same, referring to "an event or personal experience often identified as coincidence, so astonishing that it is seen as a sign of divine intervention, especially when perceived as the answer to a prayer." The challenge is to be on the lookout for Godwinks in our lives!

I believe in Godwinks. On Cantata Sunday, for instance, a parishioner came up to me after the service convinced that God was confirming their decision to come back to Geneva UMC after a bit of an absence. Why? Because the moment they opened their hymnal to sing, they noticed that the hymnbook they held in their hands had been dedicated to their beloved spouse who had passed away several years back. A Godwink? A Godcidence? I think so!

Roughly two years ago, at a Board of Ordained Ministry meeting, I met Rev. Mary Gay McKinney, a retired elder just placed on the board by our Bishop. We ended up serving on several interview teams together and soon realized we had much in common theologically. We also had several very close colleagues serving as theology professors at Boston College. Fast forward - several months ago Geneva UMC was looking for someone to oversee our pastoral care ministries. So our SPRC put ads out in several venues recruiting a Coordinator of Pastoral Care. I soon received a phone call from Rev. McKinney stating she had just read an ad for the position. I had no idea she would see that ad much less act on it. I pointed her to our SPRC committee. Voila! Pastor Mary Gay will start her ministry with us the week of January 7. Coincidence? Godcidence? What do you think?

As we continue through the season of Epiphany in the New Year, I urge us, individually and as a church, to be open to, to be on the lookout for, and to act upon the signs of God's leading in our lives. Luke 2:12 speaks directly to the importance of being alert to the signs God is sending us when it states: "This will be a *sign* for you—you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." Thank God that the shepherds on that lonely hillside in Judea heard the angelic message delivered to them that night, trusted God and acted on the sign God sent them! Like those shepherds, may we be actively looking for the signs—the Godwinks—of God's direction and work in our lives. Above all, may we too, respond in faith and obedience to the signs that God is winking right at us!

Happy New Year! Worship services on the first two Sundays of the new year will focus on the season of Epiphany. Epiphany helps us experience those "aha" moments when the light of God's love in the form of Jesus breaks through the darkness and we are able to see the truth of God's revelation in the incarnation of our Savior. On the third Sunday of January we begin a six-week sermon series based on the work of our Vision 2020 team. The series will help us understand, and live into, our church's new ministry plan embodied in the phrase **Reach Up, Reach In and Reach Out.**

- January 6 Matthew 2:1-12 Epiphany Sunday/First Sunday We know the darkness of midwinter; days are short and nights are long. But there are other forms of darkness - poverty, war, oppression, hatred, prejudices and fear - forms that affect us just as they did the people of biblical times. In today's Gospel, light shines through the darkness, even to "outsiders," the Magi, who follow the light of a star to the babe of Bethlehem, the Savior of the world. They returned home transformed. Will we? Pastor Rich preaches.
- January 13 Luke 3:15-22 Jesus's baptism by John in the Jordan begins Jesus's public ministry revealing him as the Christ—the Messiah, the one foretold by prophets of old. As we reaffirm our baptismal vows on this special day, we will hear and experience God's assurance that in our baptisms we, too, are beloved children of God. God loves you and me! How wonderful! How powerful! Pastor Rich preaches.
- January 19 <u>Colossians 1:15-20</u> <u>Saturday night worship</u> at 5:00pm! Come on out for a time of informal worship in the Sanctuary as Pastor Rich addresses the question, "Just how broad is the scope of salvation that God offers through the life and work of Jesus?" As part of the answer to that question, Pastor Rich will be sharing a slide show of his eco-mission in Burkina Faso, West Africa. Pastor Rich preaches.
- January 20 <u>Isaiah 6:1-13</u> Reach Up! This is the first of a series of sermons introducing Vision 2020's ministry plan for our church embodied in the phrase Reach Up, Reach In, Reach Out. Today we focus on reaching up to God in passionate worship. We will look to the example of the prophet Isaiah whose life-changing call to ministry occurred in the context of worship. Pastor Rich's sermon will address questions such as, "What is the nature, purpose and outcome of truly passionate worship?"
- January 26 <u>Acts 2:43-47</u>; <u>2 Timothy 3:16</u> *Reach Up!* In addition to reaching up to God in passionate worship, disciples of Jesus also reach up to God in faith formation. Faith formation at UMC-Geneva occurs in many ways and many contexts. However, scripture and Bible study play a central role in faith formation as God transforms our lives according to the model of Jesus. Pastor Becky preaches.
