### So what really matters...and lasts?

It's been almost a year since I wrote these words in my Pastor's Page. I think they are as appropriate, if not more so, than last year.

> I've been finding hope in a small book given to me by a parishioner. It's aptly titled The Marks of Hope: Where the Spirit is Moving in a *Wounded Church*. This book is hot off the press (Abingdon), co-written by three young Methodist clergy for Methodists. It comes at a time when our denomination, at all levels, is wrestling with decline and division. This book reminds me of the crucial role of stories-how they shape our understanding of the world around us, and how the way we share stories matters. The book asks: What stories are we sharing in our local congregation? Are these stories about the work Christ is doing through us and around us or even in spite of us? I'm reminded that changing our stories isn't escapism. The goal is never to put on rose-tinted glasses, but how we can share our faith and our future in a way that invites fruitfulness instead of a barren place. It is very important to focus on the positive and fill our stories with hope.

What I didn't write last year I share with you now, straight from *The Marks of Hope: Where the Spirit is Moving in a Wounded Church.* As your pastor, these words from other pastors resonate deeply within me. "So what does it mean to find hope in The United Methodist Church today?...What I do know is that every day I'm charged with loving, serving, challenging, and leading the folks who have found a home in my local church and those who don't yet know God's amazing grace in Jesus Christ...In The Marks of Hope, our perspective comes from being knee-deep in ministry in a local church not of one mind. We teach, preach, counsel, and plan in the midst of good Christian women and men who do not agree, and yet our churches are growing with new disciples, fostering relationships with the poor and neglected, cultivating a place of trust for holy conversations, and creating an environment where we do our best to do justice. love kindness, and walk humbly with God (Micah 6:8)." (The Marks of Hope, p. 9)

Justice, kindness, humility—faith, hope and love abide. But the greatest of these is love. So many wonderful things are happening at UMCG right now. One of the big, positive stories that fills me with hope is our Vision 2020 initiative. You'll be hearing more about it in the weeks to come. As I said last year, it is very important to focus on the positive and fill our stories with hope. So in future weeks and months, I am looking forward to hearing your stories as we *Reach Up* to God in life-changing worship and study; Reach In to one another through generous hospitality and care, and *Reach Out* to our community and world sharing God's amazing grace through effective ministries of mission and social justice. So what really matters and lasts? Justice, kindness, humility, faith, hope and love. These endure.

### EASTER SEASON SERMON SERIES: "LIVING FOR & LOVING JESUS"

#### PART I – LIVING FOR JESUS

In these first three sermons we will explore how believing, following and listening to Jesus intersect to form a way of discipleship that witnesses to the risen Christ. (Series runs April 28 – June 9.)

May 5 Third Sunday of Easter/First Sunday/Holy Communion Living for Jesus: FOLLOW Me This post-resurrection story of a miraculous catch of fish echoes the story in Luke 5:1-11 when, at the beginning of his ministry, Jesus invites his disciples to follow him. In this postresurrection story we see the Risen Christ extending his call to follow him at the end of his ministry. Post-resurrection, the disciples often do not recognize Jesus at first. Sometimes we too are so preoccupied we miss seeing Jesus at work in our lives and in the world. Living for Jesus includes looking for Jesus in the every day events of life and following his call to care for others. Our love for others and our love for God are intertwined. John 21:1-19.

### May 12 Fourth Sunday of Easter/Mother's Day Living for Jesus: LISTEN to Me Scholarships awarded at 9:00 a.m. service.

Jesus does not always answer the questions the way we want. In today's story, people gather around him and demand that he tell them, plainly, if he is the Messiah. However, in order to hear Jesus's answers to our questions, we need to let go of what we want to hear and listen to what he is saying. Listening to Jesus also involves doing, and this passage reminds us that how we behave speaks as loudly as what we say. Living for Jesus involves both active listening and doing. John 10:22-30.

#### May 18 Saturday Evening Service 5:00 p.m. Praise Service

#### PART II: LOVING JESUS

This second set of sermons focuses on the action of God upon those who believe *in* and *into* Jesus, resulting in a divine flow of energy from God to the church and the world. All the themes in these sermons are subtitled "by a loving God."

#### May 19 Fifth Sunday of Easter Loving Jesus: MARKED by a Loving God

Jesus offers a new commandment to love one another and thus be known as his disciples. This "marking" is the way we are known and has direct connections with our baptism into Jesus's life, death and resurrection. In short, the mark of a Christian is love. John 13:31-35.

### May 26 Sixth Sunday of Easter Loving Jesus: SENT by a Loving God

John's Gospel dwells on love. In today's passage we are offered a Trinitarian model of love among God the Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer. Their "dance of love" overflows in their self-giving action to the world. God invites us into that dance of love! As God the Creator sends Jesus and the Spirit into the world, the Triune God sends us into the world to share God's overflowing love. John 14:23-29.

best bags are grocery bags from Mejier, Jewel, Fresh Market, Target, etc. Also, it is helpful if you remove the cash register receipts. Drop off the bags in the bin under the coat rack to the right of the elevator in the Atrium.

If you can crochet, we could use your help in crocheting the mats. If you don't know how, we'll teach you. Three women who are crocheting the mats had never crocheted before. This is a great way to learn. We also need bag flatteners, bag cutters and plarn makers. We have lots of fun and meet every Monday, 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 pm. Come when you can. We will attach a prayer from UMCG to each mat, and are looking forward to having the mats blessed before we drop them off.
