A Thankful Heart

If you were to walk into the family room at the Center Street parsonage, your eyes would be drawn to the sign perched above the windows next to our TV saying "a thankful heart." This gift from parishioners is in a prominent place in our home so that we are reminded daily of our blessings.

The scriptures, both Old and New Testaments, are loaded with verses reminding us of the power of praise, of offering thanks to God and others. Even Harvard Medical School acknowledges this truth! Surfing the internet recently, I ran across a blog from Harvard Medical School titled "Giving thanks can make you happier," reminding me that November kicks off the holiday season with high expectations for a cozy and festive time of year. Of course, as we all know, the holidays can also be a challenging time tinged with sadness, anxiety or depression.

Dipping into the field of theology, this blog informs us that the word "gratitude" is derived from the Latin word gratia, which means grace, graciousness or gratefulness. Gratitude is a thankful appreciation for what a person receives, whether tangible or intangible. With gratitude, we zoom in on the goodness in our lives. In the process, we usually recognize that the source of that goodness lies at least partially outside ourselves. As a result, gratitude also helps us connect to something larger than ourselves whether to other people, nature, or God. Then we are opened up to express gratitude for past blessings, present blessings (not taking good fortune for granted as it comes), and future blessings (maintaining a hopeful and affirming attitude).

The Church Year: All Saints' Day/Sunday by Jim Byrne

November is the last month in the Christian calendar. It begins with **All Saints' Day** (November 1) and All Souls Day (November 2). In some denominations they are celebrated separately with All Saints Day focusing on the heroes and martyrs of Christianity who have been formally recognized as such and All Souls Day focusing on all of the "faithful departed." In the UMC, the days are celebrated together on the



first Sunday of the month as a time to give thanks for all who have gone before us in the Christian faith, those who are called the "great cloud of witnesses: in Hebrews 12 and the "communion of saints" in The Apostles' Creed. Paul called all believers in the emerging church "saints," and in the hymn "Come, Let Us Join Our Friends Above," Charles Wesley called for the celebration of all who have walked before us in faith: "Let saints on earth unite to sing, with those to glory gone, / for all the servants of our King in earth and heaven, are one." What special people who have "to glory gone" will you celebrate this year?

Christians end the year by celebrating **Christ the King Sunday**, the last Sunday after Pentecost, the last day of the liturgical calendar, and the last Sunday before Advent. This year it is November 24. For Christians, the celebration is not about the end of something. It is a special day on which to celebrate Christ as the ultimate authority in our lives, as the Messiah who fulfilled Old Testament prophecy, and as our Savior who will come again. It is a day to celebrate the full authority in our lives of Christ, our sovereign in all things. **Christ the King Sunday** is a day of expectation which helps to prepare Christians for the celebration of Advent and the Christmas season in the spirit of the line from a beloved hymn: "Joy to the world! The Lord is come. Let earth receive her King."

MINISTRY ARCHITECTS VISIT A SUCCESS!

We had a very successful evaluation phase last month with *Ministry Architects* consultants. Approximately 60 people met with or emailed them their observations and concerns about our current programs, along with hopes and visions. *MA* compared our programs to norms from hundreds of churches, and identified our strengths: a church-wide commitment to Children's and Youth Ministry, ASP, VBS, and dedicated volunteers. They also identified some challenges we should

address: additional volunteers, some retuning of our programs, new focuses for the Children's and Youth Councils, and programs to reach out to new children and youth. The consultants outlined a month-by-month plan to help us reach these goals. *MA's* complete report will be available soon. The next step is Church Council approval of the *MA* proposal to walk with us in this investment in our Children's and Youth Ministries. **THANK YOU to everyone who took part!**





Notes from 2019 UMCG Church Conference on October 9

Business of the Church Conference

Reports from church committees and staff were distributed. After a hymn and opening prayer, the first item on the agenda was voting on the pastor's compensation for 2020. It will be the same as 2019, because Pastors Rich and Esther both declined the 1% raise that was offered. For leadership and nominations, Pastor Rich submitted the current slate and proposed to keep it, giving Council permission to edit throughout the year.

Sharing Conference Shepherding Team Vision

D.S. Rev. Jeffry Bross spoke about the Lay Academy, and said they are adding some new classes and will also be training church mentors to go out to churches.

Bross asked about what we celebrate that's good, and how we are welcoming to others. He said he and the conference are trying to help us figure out who we are as a church and be better at it. Bross elaborated on 3 major emphases from our Shepherding Team:

- 1) To Grow and Reach New Disciples of Jesus Christ. If we have a good process a system we are more likely to grow. Do we have a known and detailed way to move people from guest to member with associated spiritual development?
- 2) To Live Out the Conviction that Racism is Incompatible with Christian Teachings.
- 3) To Increase the Number of Highly Vital Congregations. We need to grow churches.

Bross said there will be a district workshop covering these three areas on January 25.

Message from the Bishop and the D.S.

Our bishop is retiring as of September 1, 2020; so we will have a new bishop. Bross said two new bishops will be voted in at the Jurisdictional conference, and we likely will be assigned one of the new ones. The NIC is going to restructure our districts from 6 to 5 in the next two years, so each district will go from 65 to about 85 churches.

Presently our conference is below the \$5 million budget level – at \$4.6 – this means we can't function as a conference and insurance costs increase. The Northern Illinois Conference will most likely be merged with another conference in the next 4 years. Bross also indicated that they expect there to be some sort of split at General Conference, but do not have all the legislation.

Bross emphasized how important communications is, and has a volunteer checking out the websites of every church he visits. He said UMCG's is one of the better ones he's seen.

Since last year's conference, we have baptized one baby, confirmed 4 youth, and received 3 new members. Twenty-eight people attended the conference, which closed with a hymn and benediction.

Not only is she going to be the chairperson of the UMCG Missions Committee and a member of the Church Council, she volunteered her expertise as a retired teacher in teaching and advocating for Youth by joining the Renovation Team, working with the Youth ministry consultants, Ministry Architects and, she willingly took on the responsibility of being representative to our Annual Conference, and was one of the 3 representatives from our church who participated in the Leadership Institute in Leawood, Kansas.

Sharon says," As frustrated as I've felt about the overall Church and all its follies of late, as tempted as I've been to walk away, I keep coming back to my UMC of Geneva. Why, you may ask. Because this is my family. These are the people, as imperfect as they are, who with love and sincerity look me in the eye, give me a hug, and ask me how I'm doing. These are the people who I can have honest conversation with about who Jesus is and how we can become Jesus to each other and our community. These are the people who accept me with all my imperfections and realize that I, like them, are a work in progress."
