#### **AUGUST HAS FINALLY ARRIVED!**

Though I have been working with staff and leaders since Bishop Hopkins announced the appointment 25 weeks ago, I'm glad to finally begin ministry together in full!

In some ways, I feel like this long transition has been a bit like waiting on a baby to arrive. I've experienced excitement, trepidation, hope, wonder, curiosity, confusion, anxiety, joy and probably a host of other emotions as this month has drawn near.

Returning to Geneva is unique in that I've had some experience serving in this community before. So if I continue this metaphor of childbirth, returning to Geneva has been more like waiting on Ella, our second daughter to be born. I had four years of parenting under my belt already with Lily, so I was confident about baby basics and yet this is a whole new person and a whole new chapter in the life of our family. While Meghan and I didn't know how, we knew that life would change when a new person came into our lives and that is as scary as it is exciting. Perhaps you can relate to these emotions either as parents or just starting a whole new chapter in your life.

When I think of new chapters, I am reminded of all the people in the Bible that had new starts. Everyone from Adam and Eve after they left the garden, to Abram and Sarai whose long journey included name changes and a whole host of challenges and Naomi whose bitter life becomes sweet. There is brash Simon who became a great preacher and leader, Peter and zealous Saul who became Paul. Each of these life stories shows us that God's handiwork is with us in the present moment, shaping us to be used by God to transform lives and the world.

So in the flutter of emotions of this transition, I trust God is shaping me -and all of us- to be used by God to transform lives and the world. I'm also reminded that God's work takes a long time to come to fruition and so we must patiently and faithfully wait upon the Lord to do God's work.

When we were expecting Ella, her big sister Lily was so excited to get a playmate. Lily was disappointed to learn that it would take several weeks before they could even play baby games, let alone a few years for Ella to grow big enough to keep up with her. Lily was ready for her hopes and dreams to come all at once, right away.

#### **August 2021 Sunday Worship Schedule**

#### August 1 - Pastor Rob Hamilton Preaches - "Homecoming" Mark 6:1-13

As Pastor Rob Hamilton returns to UMCG as our new lead pastor it is a bit of a homecoming as Pastor Rob served as our Associate Pastor from 2011-2015 we will look briefly at the action packed 6th chapter of Marks' gospel which begins with a homecoming for Jesus.

Upon arrival back home, there was quickly a disconnect between the people who remember Jesus as the kid they watched grow up and the man present before them, Jesus the itinerant preacher and Son of God. Now, Pastor Rob isn't equating himself to Jesus, but there are similarities to these present and Biblical situations that the Holy Spirit stirs within us as we reconnect with each other in this season of homecoming.

August 8 - ASP SUNDAY - After a 2 year hiatus due to Covid, a group of 40 volunteers representing UMC of Geneva travelled to Bell County, KY July 4-10 for a week of work and fellowship in the mountains of Appalachia. UMCG has participated with the Appalachia Service Project for more than 30 years. Join us on Sunday, August 8 as this year's participants come back together to share their stories and sing songs from the mountains! Online worshippers please plan to watch LIVE at 9 am as we broadcast worship live tentatively via YouTube from our Hamilton Street sanctuary with members from our most recent Appalachia Service Project leading worship and giving witness to the ways God is at work in their ministry.

#### August 15 - Pastor Rob Hamilton - "When Your Past Catches Up to You" - Mark 6:14-29

Mark's narrative moves from the beginning of Jesus' expansion of ministry with the disciples to a flashback with Herod who -in wondering about Jesus' identity- recalls what happened to John the Baptist. We all have those moments when something in the past suddenly catches up to us and we have to choose to dwell in the past or move faithfully and boldly into the present future God sets before us. How might God be working in our moments of when the past catches up to us?

#### "See All the People" - A Six-Week Series

Jesus' itinerant ministry was all inclusive. Jesus includes those within the religious establishment (and often Jesus was critical of these folks) but Jesus' most generous and loving action and messages were with those outside the religious establishment. Being able to see all the people brought salvation to those who were excluded and invited those established religious folk to new vitality in their relationship with God as the new Kingdom Jesus proclaimed comes on earth as it is in heaven.

#### August 22 - Pastor Rob Hamilton - "See All the People" Mark 6:30-34, 53-56

Jesus is tired from his broad reaching ministry. In seeking to find rest and renewal he stumbles upon a needy crowd and instead of focusing on his own needs, Jesus sees the crowd with compassion and feeds them. Many times in our walk we can be like Jesus busy and tired with all our existing life and ministry and still Jesus calls us to really see all the people around us with compassion and to offer them the Bread of Life and Living Water. This Sunday, we will also be blessing backpacks for the new school year. Students and staff alike are welcome to bring their bag to be blessed for the school year.

**August 29 - Pastor Lisa Telomen** continues our series on seeing all the people by exploring the story of the woman at the well from <u>John 4:5-42</u>.

ASP 2021 was an unmitigated success for the group of 40 youth and adults sponsored by the United Methodist Church of Geneva. Our group faced a number of

'unknowns' this year in more ways than one; because of Zoom meetings, many of us only met in person for the first time the day before we left! We also successfully navigated the strict Coronavirus protocols allowing every volunteer to fully complete the experience. For those unfamiliar with ASP, otherwise known as the Appalachia Service Project, it is a home repair based Christian ministry operating in the Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, & West Virginia area of the Appalachian Mountains. On Sunday July 4th, our group headed to Bell County, KY where we split into 6 work crews and spent the next 5 days loading into our vans with tools, supplies, and sleepy smiles to spend the day working through sun, rain, and occasional tick bites! As you will see from the many

exciting pictures of youth and young-at-heart adults, we spent an amazing week meeting brothers and sisters in Christian love right where they live.

#### **Creation Care**

Many of us are familiar with the three R's. REDUCE, REUSE and RECYCLE. Our children learn about them in school. Many of us practice them at home. We rinse our single use plastics and place them in our bins each week. But, even with all our good intentions a large percentage (some research numbers are as high as 91%) of those plastics are NOT recycled. They end up in landfills, are incinerated, or end up in our waterways and oceans. So what do we do? Many are talking about the new fourth "R". REFUSE.

As United Methodists we are called to be caretakers of our earth. How can the Geneva UMC be part of the solution for the single use plastic problem that is overwhelming our earth? On June 10 the Creation Care Team presented the <a href="mailto:environ-mental-policy">environ-mental-policy</a> to Church Council where it was voted on and passed.

Some of you have already enjoyed our Zero Waste Coffee Time on the lawn after church service. Washable mugs and cups have replaced the Styrofoam and plastic cups used in the past. The coffee grounds and filters are composted along with napkins and paper packaging from sugar packets. No garbage bags are used. Truly, no waste is made but great coffee, juice and fellow-

ship is enjoyed. Since our return of Coffee Fellowship on June 20, 97 single use coffee and juice cups have been kept out of the landfill.

How can you also REFUSE at home?

- ✓ Reusable shopping bags are back! Say "No" to the plastic bags when shopping.
- ✓ Buy your eggs in a cardboard container (compostable) and not in plastic or Styrofoam.
- Refuse the straw and single use utensils and use a reusable water bottle and thermal cups.
- When you need to purchase single use drinks buy in aluminum cans that are easily recycled curbside or used by some organizations for fundraising.
- ✓ Swap out that plastic container of shampoo or liquid soap for bar shampoo and soap.

Start with just one change and remember...



#### **Missions Updates**

We have received messages from our mission partners in Haiti (Kids Alive International) and Bolivia (missionaries Jeff and Debbie Wasilevich) about their situation on the ground as they are dealing with the pandemic and political instability. The Mission Committee feels it is important for all of us to read these letters, so that as a faith community we can be informed and pray more specifically for our international friends.

Hi Chris, Sharon and UMCG,

By now you may have heard about the assassination of Haiti's President, Jovenel Moïse, and the non-fatal assault Haitian first lady Martine Moise. Robenson Gedeus, Kids Alive Country Director, passed along an update to share with you about Haiti's political situation.

Two days after the death of the president, the country is placed in a state of siege. The police (assisted by the population) arrested 28 mercenaries, including 26 Colombians and 2 Haitian Americans. As a result, the United States sent an FBI team to investigate the implications of its citizens.

Since the announcement of the assassination, the streets have been deserted. People who are afraid of what might happen are stressed and afraid to go out. There are several rumors that the country will be blocked from next Monday. The consequence is that people are rushing to get their supplies and that the gasoline shortage is exacerbated. Supermarkets only stay open for a few hours and close very early.

As for Kids Alive, we too are under pressure. The supply was done last weekend to avoid any shortages in case the rumors become true. The lack of gasoline also affects us, so we rely on the solar panel system as a last resort. Parents and children are shocked, anxious, and apprehensive about what might happen in the coming weeks.

The coming weeks are uncertain. Many threats arise. Rumors (whether true or false), which could incite the people to anger are surfacing. And a power struggle risks breaking out between the opposition and the current government. In short, the country is quite unstable at the moment and could turn upside down at any time.

We ask you to continue to pray for us. Today Haiti needs it more than ever.

We will continue to keep you informed of the latest news.

Got the money!!! Thanks!! And please thank your whole church for us!!!

Actually we got the cash in hand Monday, but it has taken two days to send this email.... Such is the internet here.... Heading into La Paz Thursday. I have an actual appointment to get our dog's papers in order for a visit to the US.... Sounds promising and we will keep you advised.

It's very cold here this morning. Heavy freeze. Even a skim of ice on our bedside water glasses.

COVID... We don't understand how some folks in the US really believe that this virus isn't dangerous. They should come visit a place like Copa where people are still dying from it at a scary rate. You see black bows on most doorways. People hang black bows made out of black plastic bags on the entrance to homes, shops and offices where people have died. There are black bows on the electric company, municipal building, bank, police department, basilica, and the "fiscal" office (attorney general for Copa). This along with the daily processions of family members carrying a coffin to the cemetery and daily stories of new people sick with the virus make Copa a pretty grim place.

I needed a taxi yesterday and there were none to be found by the deserted plaza. I called a friend, Max, who has a taxi, but I haven't seen him in a month or so. He said he was available. When he picked me up, I asked where he's been. He said both he and his wife were hospitalized in La Paz the entire month of June with COVID, but luckily for their kids have recovered. People in the US should know of this.


