## News about the UMC Commission on the Way Forward and Special Session of General Conference

Delegates from each Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church are preparing to meet in Special Session of the General Conference in St. Louis, Feb. 23-26, 2019. Their purpose is to receive and act on the report of the *Commission on a Way Forward*, based on the recommendations of the Council of Bishops.

This issue contains two documents to help us understand the options and the resulting outcome. See pages 12-15.

General Conference is the top policy-making body of the United Methodist Church. It is an international body of about 1,000 elected delegates that convenes every four years, and is scheduled to meet in 2020 in Minneapolis.

## Pastor's Page

## **Courageous Conversations**

"The quality of our lives comes out of the quality of our dialogues and conversations," so says Mark Hansen, creator of the bestselling book series *Chicken Soup for the Soul*. No doubt each one of us can recall such defining moments that literally shaped our lives, our relationships, and our world. Starting this month, UMC-Geneva will begin to engage in a number of courageous conversations that will equally influence the life of our church.

- 1. Our global denomination will engage in one courageous conversation as delegates from around the world meet for a **special session of General Conference** in St. Louis, February 23-26. The main purpose is to receive and act on a report from the Commission on a Way Forward (COWF) that examined paragraphs in the Book of Discipline concerning human sexuality and explored options to strengthen the unity of the church. Your pastors have provided the congregation with three clear documents (in hard copy and electronic form) that explain 1) the purpose and process of the COWF; 2) the COWF's three major options that will be presented in St. Louis; and 3) a 2019 communication tool kit to help us engage in courageous conversations before the conference. In addition, your pastors have asked that both Church Council and Church and Society committees work with us to hold several opportunities for us to engage in discussion before and after the conference. Note: Regardless of the outcome of the vote, your pastors will remain at UMC-Geneva and move with you into whatever future God holds for us. The earliest any changes will take place at our Annual Conference level will be in roughly two years.
- 2. Last year Church Council appointed a special team, Vision 2020, to address the future of our church—both our challenges (declining numbers of members; worship attendees; children, youth and young adults, etc.) AND our opportunities (such as building on our strengths in the areas of music, outreach, and caring community). Vision 2020 seeks, with God's guidance and help, to turn the ship around and get us all on the same page via a ministry plan centered on our purpose to Reach Up! Reach In! Reach Out! You may have seen these phrases in the Messenger, our worship bulletins, weekly e-blasts, etc. And your pastors are currently in the middle of a six-week sermon series providing the biblical and theological basis for our church's ministries of Reaching Up to God in worship and spiritual growth, Reaching In to one another as a warm, caring community of faith, and Reaching Out to a hurting world through our many social justice ministries and missions. This month, Vision 2020 will begin to engage our church in a series of courageous conversations open to everyone in our church family. This will not be a 'flash in the pan' but an ongoing process led by Vision 2020, Church Council, and your pastors. Please join us. How can we proceed without you in the conversation?
- 3. Following a **Capital Campaign feasibility study** late last Fall, our Trustees will be leading a series of info-shares and building tours explaining our church's building needs in crucial areas such as a failing HVAC system, a leaky roof in the sanctuary, and leaky windows in the Fellowship Hall. Please accept the Trustees' invitations to engage in yet more courageous conversations on the strategic role that our building plays in all of our ministries.

Remember...the quality of our lives comes out of the quality of our conversations. Can we talk here at UMCG? I believe we can!

## February 3 Reach In!

In addition to Reaching Up to God in worship and spiritual growth (sermons 1 and 2 in January), we Reach In to one another as a caring community of faith. What does it mean to care for one another? **Pastor Rich**, in his sermon titled "Who Cares?" will explore this vital aspect of our life together through an exposition of the "one another" verses in the New Testament.

### February 10 Reach In!

Inviting and welcoming others into meaningful, supportive fellowship is integral to being a warm and hospitable congregation. What can we learn from the early church in these areas? **Pastor Esther's** sermon will help us understand the crucial importance of being an inviting, welcoming, and hospitable church.

## February 16 Saturday Evening Worship

On the third Saturday of each month, we will worship at 5 p.m. in the Sanctuary, followed by a time of fellowship and refreshments. Each month we will focus on a particular ministry or mission of our church. Our focus this month is on immigration and the ministry of Justice for Our Neighbors (JFON). **Pastor Esther** will be sharing her personal experience as an immigrant and her work as a board member of JFON, and Claudia Marchan, Executive Director of JFON, will give a presentation.

### February 17 Reach Out!

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to reach out beyond the walls of our church in acts of compassion and acts of justice. Compassion is showing kindness to others. Justice creates change that makes things fairer in our community, society and world. In his sermon "What Should We Do?" **Pastor Rich** will preach from <u>Micah 6:8</u> and demonstrate how Jesus's prophetic ministry of compassion and justice in Luke's Gospel serves as an example for us today.

## February 24 Reach Out!

What, exactly, is the mission of the church? Our church? In his sermon, "Yes...You Are a Missionary!" **Pastor Rich** will preach from two of Jesus's Great Commissions: <u>Matthew 28:16-20</u> and <u>Acts 1:8</u>, and apply these passages to the life and mission of our church.

## Commission on a Way Forward: 5 Things You Need to Now

As a United Methodist, you may have heard about some of the things happening in our church today around the issues of human sexuality. There will be a <u>Special Session of General Conference</u> in February 2019, to receive and act upon a report by a group called the Commission on a Way Forward. This important work will help shape the future of The United Methodist Church.

These five things offer an overview of the Commission on a Way Forward, and what will be discussed and decided at the 2019 General Conference Special Session. Many links are included that take you to pages where you can learn much more.

## 1. Beginnings

At <u>General Conference 2016</u> in Portland, there were an overwhelming number of proposals dealing with issues surrounding same-sex marriage, the ordination of LGBTQ clergy, and related topics. During a discussion about how to proceed, a clergy delegate addressed the bishops, "We are asking for your leadership." Another added, "We are in a stuck place... I'm pleading with you. Please help us."

The bishops returned later in the <u>General Conference</u> with a plan. They would create a group to research and advise them of ways to help us get unstuck, to move us forward. The group they later brought together is the Commission on a Way Forward. *More about the formation of the commission <u>here and here</u>.* 

## 2. Task

The bishops carefully formed the Commission on a Way Forward, inviting 32 people who identified on all sides of the issues to be part of this special group. Eight bishops, 13 other clergy members, and 11 lay members constitute the commission. *More about the members here*.

The work of the Commission on a Way Forward is "to inform deliberation across the whole church and to help the <u>Council of Bishops</u> in their service to the next General Conference in finding a way forward." <u>More on their "About Us" page</u>.

The commission regularly reported to the bishops during their work (see timeline to the right). Their <u>final</u> <u>report</u> will be presented to a <u>special session of General Conference</u>, February 23-26, 2019, in St. Louis, Missouri.

## 3. Issues

As the Commission on a Way Forward was beginning their work, the <u>United Methodist General Board of</u> <u>Higher Education and Ministry</u> (GBHEM) invited scholars to a gathering called "Unity of the Church and Human Sexuality: Toward a Faithful United Methodist Witness." Twenty-eight academics from three countries gathered for three days in March 2017, at Candler School of Theology in Atlanta, Georgia, to present papers and discuss the issues. Eight members of the Commission on a Way Forward attended the event. *More about this gathering here*.

Following the gathering, GBHEM produced <u>Unity of the Church and Human Sexuality</u>, a study guide based on the scholars' conversation. The study guide is available <u>free online here</u>. ## 4. Recommendations

On July 31, 2018, the <u>final report of the Commission on a Way Forward</u> was released in the four official languages of The United Methodist Church. The report may be downloaded in <u>English</u>, <u>French</u>, <u>Portuguese</u>, <u>Swahili</u> and <u>Spanish</u>.

## 5. Who decides?

The report of the Commission on a Way Forward will be received and acted upon by a <u>special session</u> <u>of General Conference</u> in St. Louis, Missouri, February 23-26, 2019. This worldwide gathering of United Methodists will only act on items around our deep divide over homosexuality. <u>More here</u>.

Originally, the Commission on a Way Forward understood their role as advisory to the Council of Bishops, who would then report to the special General Conference session. A <u>ruling of the Judicial Council</u> on May 25, 2018, clarified that the Commission on a Way Forward is to report directly to the General Conference. <u>More here</u>.

At the request of the Council of Bishops, the Judicial Council <u>reviewed proposed legislation</u> for the <u>One Church, Connectional Conference, and Traditional plans</u> to determine their constitutionality. Oral hearings were held during their gathering in Zurich, Switzerland, October 23-26, 2018. <u>Their decision</u> was released on October 26.

Most of the delegates for the 2019 General Conference will be those who attended the 2016 General Conference, though <u>The Book of Discipline</u> allows annual conferences to elect new delegates if they so choose. As with every General Conference the number of clergy and lay (non-clergy) delegates will be equal. Bishops preside, but do not vote. <u>More about General Conferences here</u>.

Our next regular General Conference will be held May 5-15, 2020, in Minneapolis, Minnesota.
