We have been using Dr. Phil Maynard's book *Shift: Helping Congregations Back Into the Game of Effective Ministry* to help us flesh out what radical hospitality looks like. We'll finish our focus on hospitality on First/Communion Sunday October 6. For the remaining three Sundays in October, we'll feature the chapter in *Shift* titled "From Worship as an Event to Worship as a Lifestyle."

October 6 First Sunday/World Communion Sunday/Communion Incarnational Hospitality: Relationships Beyond Our Walls (John 1:14, Philippians 2:5-8)

Incarnational hospitality refers to building relationships with people beyond the walls of our church. The end goal - the 'why' of hospitality is that people become disciples of Jesus, fully engaged in the life and ministry of his body, the church. **Pastor Esther preaches.**

October 13 Worship Directions: From the Church to the World (Isaiah 6) In this service Pastor Rich will use Isaiah's amazing experience of God in the temple in which he looked up and caught a powerful glimpse of who God really is. This led Isaiah to gaze inward and experience God's love and forgiveness. And that worship experience led Isaiah's gaze beyond the walls of the temple to a life of service and mission in the world.

October 20 Worship GPS (Psalm 100) Every one of us needs guidance in life, and worship offers us a weekly opportunity to find God's guidance for our daily lives. Worship is where we, as a community of faith, give honor and glory to God as we deepen our faith. Worship that is God-Centered, Participatory, and Sensory leads us to a lifestyle of worship throughout the week. Pastor Becky preaches.

October 27 Worship: From Event to Lifestyle (Romans 12:1-2) Great worship, life transforming worship moves us from the worship service as an event, to a lifestyle of worship in which we constantly present our whole lives to God, "which is our spiritual worship." Pastor Rich preaches.
