The Road to General Conference 2020

Bishop Sally Dyck and members of our NIC delegation to GC 2020 held six conversations across the Northern Illinois Conference. Nine UMCG'ers participated at the Sycamore UMC session on February 16.

The conversation focused on explaining what is happening with legislation going to GC 2020, and the role of our NIC delegates. Bishop Dyck spoke, joined by delegates Rev. Chris Winkler (Chair), Rev. Brian Gilbert, and several other delegates.

Here are some important facts for you to know:

- A mediator and diverse UM group released the **Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation** in January. Many of the different plans going to GC have been stepped back, allowing the Protocol to take precedence. Find it here: **www.gracethroughseparation.com/legislation**

Since we are sharing the Pastor's Page this month, I'd like to reflect on the text Pastor Esther referred to from Ecclesiastes. Indeed, there is a time for every season under heaven. And that applies to the change of seasons in the church calendar. It seems as though it was only vesterday that we were adorning the sanctuary with blue paraments and banners, setting up our beautiful Chrismon tree, and placing a manger and images of angels above the chancel. We lit the Advent Candle for four weeks while your pastors wore blue stoles. Ash Wednesday marks the transition into the season of Lent with the imposition of ashes. The color of the sanctuary, paraments and pastors' stoles turn to purple for this season

Both Advent and Lent are seasons of preparation. Each season leads up to one of the two most important holy days in the church calendar: Christmas and Easter. Advent anticipates the birth of the babe of Bethlehem and the consummation of history in the second coming of Jesus Christ. The color blue in Advent thus reflects anticipation and hope, while the color purple reflects the somber, solemn mood of preparation for Jesus's crucifixion and death.

As we journey with Jesus to Jerusalem and his death this Lenten season, let's remind ourselves of the way the story of Jesus ends. Death does not have the final word. God does – in the resurrection of Jesus! Above all, as people of resurrection and hope, God promises that "we will all be with the Lord forever. So encourage each other with these words." (1 Thessalonians 4:17,18)

As we enter the season of Lent in preparation for Easter, we continue to preach from the *Revised Common Lectionary. This month's scriptures evoke a series of questions reflected in the sermon title for each Sunday. Are we seeking God's best? Are we givers or takers? What are we thirsting for in life? What brings us spiritual sight? Are our futures hopeless or hopeful? As we make the Lenten journey to the cross and resurrection, remember - Jesus walks with us.

March 1 1st Sunday in Lent/Family Worship/Communion (Matthew 4:1-11) Moses is tempted in the wilderness and fails. Later, Jesus, the new Moses, is also tempted in the wilderness but succeeds. Jesus refused temptations (feeding, rescuing, ruling) that were all good. However, these good things would have kept him from fulfilling God's best – his role as Savior and harbinger of God's kingdom on earth. Temptation to pursue lesser goods instead of God's best is something to which we can all relate. Pastor Rich preaches: Good? Better? Best?

March 82nd Sunday in Lent (John 3:1-17)John assures us that Jesus was not sent into the world to condemn it, but to save it. God
so loved that God gave. And our lives have been forever changed. God is a giver, not a
taker. Is the same true of us? Pastor Esther preaches: Giver? Or Taker?

March 15 3rd Sunday in Lent (John 4:5-42)

During their wilderness wanderings the Israelites doubted God's presence and often felt parched. The Samaritan woman at the well was thirsting for a better life. At times we too are thirsty both physically and spiritually. The good news is that Christ's love and grace are always available to quench our troubled souls and nourish us with abundant life, in this life and the next. **Pastor Rich preaches:** *Thirsty?*

March 22 4th Sunday in Lent (John 9:1-41) In this story Jesus heals a man who was blind from birth and we find ourselves

confronted with a paradox operating on both the physical and spiritual levels. The man born blind ends up with the ability to see, both spiritually and physically. However, the religious leaders of the day, although they have physical sight, remain spiritually blind. Pastor Becky preaches: *Who Is Jesus? What Blinds Us?*

March 29 5th Sunday in Lent (John 11:1-45)

We feel dried up, devoid of breath, aching from the loss of loved ones. But death and loss do not have the final word. We worship a God who brings us new life, new visions and hope. We place our hope in the God who has power even over death. **Pastor Rich preaches:** *Hopeless? Or Hopeful?*

Reading the Gospels During Lent 2020 The Reading Plan - by Jim Byrne

The following reading plan is offered as a guide to enriching your Lenten experience. Before you read each day, **prepare** by clearing your mind of the distraction in your life so that you can focus totally on the Bible passage. **Read** silently or aloud with both

mind and heart open to the message. When you finish, **reflect** on what you have read, on how it relates to other passages in the Bible, and on how it relates to your life. **Share** what you have read. Most importantly, **pray** to God in thanksgiving/supplication, and **listen** in silence for God's voice.

Highlights from Church Council

Sunday, Feb. 16

The Board of Trustees reported they had replaced the 25-year-old commercial refrigerator in the kitchen, which had broken and needed costly repairs. They were able to replace it with an efficient new refrigerator thanks to a donation from Memorials arriving the week before.

The Trustees also reported that the old rooftop HVAC unit that serves the basement area broke down in January. We have multiple units to cover our entire building. Repairs have been made at a cost of around \$4,000. The final bill is not in yet. This is just a reminder that we do need the Capital Campaign for our HVAC system soon.

Church Council decided to transfer the work of the Council sub-committee *All Means All Team* to Church in Society, which will continue the work and maintain the relationships established by *AMA* in the areas of immigration, racism, interfaith relations, and LGBTQ issues.
