Pastor's Page

I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now...It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me...And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more... Philippians 1:3-11

With the news of my uncle's passing, the inability to travel to celebrate his life with the rest of the family in South Korea, in addition to all that the COVID19 pandemic has brought on, to be honest and transparent, I was deeply saddened and grieved **but I didn't shed a tear!** I always thought of myself as too sensitive with the ability to shed a tear at the "drop of a hat." But in these several weeks, I found my eyes dry, my heart firm, and my neck stiffly standing. I was able to keep my composure, was productive as usual, and my head was clear. I found it very odd! Shouldn't my head be planted in the palm of my hands, distraught and unable to function, and hidden under my blanket, shell-shocked and in despair? Could anyone blame me if I was in that state?

As I stayed up one night perplexed and praying, 'God, have I gone numb, hardhearted, and callused already at 10 years of full-time ministry?' I was overcome with gratitude, much like what Apostle Paul wrote in the letter to his church in Philippi, "I thank God every time I remember you!" as my mind wandered to the flashing images of the messages of encouragement and love from all my friends.

Phone calls, emails, text messages, cards, and letters... For the last couple weeks, I have been blessed by many of you who expressed your condolences, thoughts, and prayers as my family experienced the loss of my beloved uncle in South Korea. Then in recent days, I have been showered with messages of birthday blessings as well as Easter greetings as I was privileged to celebrate those two joys on the same day this year. When I bravely shared my grief and decided to allow others to walk with me in my joys and my pain. I realized that I was being sustained by the thoughts and prayers of many. I was being held up by the people God sent into my life whether or not I knew where the strength was coming from.

As I am nearing the end of my time at UMC-Geneva, this will be what I would remember most: the visible and invisible ways you all have shown God's grace, and how in those unexpected moments, I was held up by your walk with me through the thick and thin.

THIS is what UMCG is good at! THIS is what our community needs to know. THIS is what our world needs. More of that love you have shown me. Keep loving - keep praying - keep serving - and keep giving! Love is overflowing from UMCG even if COVID-19 locks the doors of our church building, even if masks cover our mouths - love is oozing out of those small cracks!

May 3 Good Shepherd Sunday – John 10: 1-10

Immediately preceding today's scripture, Jesus heals an isolated, vulnerable blind man. Having received both physical and spiritual sight, this healed man now knows sustenance and security. In this same passage, Jesus refers to himself as the Good Shepherd and the Gate, the one who offers to meet our basic needs for safety, shelter, sustenance and life. What does it mean for us to be protected by our Good Shepherd amidst the fear and unknown of the pandemic we are experiencing? Pastor Rich preaches a sermon titled "Safe and Secure."

May 10 Mother's Day - Psalm 31:1-5, 15-16

Psalm 31 is a lament that cries out to God for comfort, protection, and rescue. Living through this pandemic brings the same reaction from us – we cry out for help, for protection and for things to return to normal. As we celebrate our mothers and grandmothers, what can we learn from their faith and the way they endured through difficulties in their lives? Pastor Becky preaches "A Mother's Faith."

May 17 The Promised Spirit – John 14:15-21

Today's passage pre-figures Pentecost as Jesus promises to send another Advocate, the Spirit of truth and love who abides with us, comforts us, leads and guides us. How do we experience this Spirit in our lives today, both individually and corporately? Pastor Rich preaches on "The Spirit of Truth & Love."

May 24 Ascension Sunday – Acts 1:1-11

Where does your gaze fall most of the time? Heaven or earth? While today's scripture relates the story of Jesus's ascension into heaven, it reminds us that his disciples were told to focus their gaze on earth. Like those first disciples, our gaze is not centered on heaven, indifferent to the needs and injustices of our neighbors. Instead we are called to continue Christ's ministry on earth starting right here in our community and on out to the ends of the earth. Pastor Rich preaches a sermon on "Witnesses."

May 31 Pentecost Sunday – Acts 2:1-21

The Holy Spirit arrived with howling winds, flames of fire, trembling earth and truth proclaimed in the midst of a "pilgrimage festival." In that busyness, the Church was born! The Holy Spirit came to empower the newborn Church in a myriad of ways: adopting, inspiring, guiding, encouraging and strengthening it for mission evident in how it's effect was made visible. How? And what? So now what? (Adapted from *Abingdon Worship Annual 2018*) Pastor Esther preaches a sermon titled "The Reverse of the Babel."

Reading The Acts of the Apostles During Eastertide 2020

The Reading Plan by Jim Byrne

The season of Easter, or Eastertide, stretches from Easter Sunday to Pentecost, 50 days. It is a time of celebration of Christ's resurrection. The following reading plan is offered as a guide to enriching your Eastertide experience. Before you begin reading each day, **prepare** by clearing your mind of the distraction in your life so that you can focus totally on the Bible passage. **Read** silently or aloud with both mind and heart open to the message. When you finish, **reflect** on what you have read, on how it relates to other passages in the Bible, and on how it relates to your life. **Share** what you have read and your reactions with family, a "reading buddy," or a reading or study group with whom you enjoy fellowship face-to-face, by telephone, or by e-mail, Facebook or other social media. Most importantly, **pray** to God in thanksgiving and supplication, and **listen** in silence for His voice.
