Lent...

The Christian season of Lent is the 40 days before Easter, not counting Sundays, which are considered mini-Easters. The word Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon *lencten*, meaning spring. Lent is traditionally a time for repentance, self-reflection, and recalibrating ourselves spiritually. Historically, it was also a time for fasting and for new members to prepare for their baptism. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday.

Today, Lent is known as a time for giving up things as well as for taking on new life-giving practices. It's a good time to practice spiritual disciplines such as daily scripture or devotional readings, daily prayer, sacrifice, rest (Sabbath), and serving others, in an intentional and concerted effort to grow closer to God in our faith.

Here's some things you might try this Lent:

Reading through the Gospels (see page 5)

Once a week, have a **simple meal** and donate what you might have spent on the meal

Try some different **ways to pray**: use prayer beads, a finger or coloring labyrinth, pray a Psalm, pray the Daily Office

Participate in a church **study group** (see page 6) As a family collect coins & **donate** to Heifer Fund **Worship online** every week

Read an online **devotional** like upperroom.org/devotionals **Simplify** your life - how many ways can you think of to do this? Find a safe way to **help others** - donate to a food bank or UMCO **Give up** a bad habit and focus on being more positive **Read** a book by using the UMCG **Amplify** resource (see page 6)

March 7 – 3rd Sunday In Lent/Holy Communion <u>John 2:13-22</u>

In the story of Jesus cleansing the temple, we come face to face with "embodiment." In a context where the temple building in Jerusalem was seen as the center of God's activity, Jesus "turned the tables" and pointed to his body as the real temple of God. In the incarnation, God chose to localize God's love in a human body. As followers of Jesus, how do our churches today embody the love of God? How do we as disciples, embody the love of God? How are we and our churches doing at turning the tables on profit and privilege for some, to encourage God's grace and blessings poured out for all? Let's practice being this abundant love of Christ this Lent! *Have your juice and bread or premade packet ready to join in celebrating Communion*. Pastor Lisa preaches, "Our Challenge: to Re-present God's Love?"

March 14 – 4th Sunday in Lent <u>John 3:14-21</u>

Today's familiar passage invites us to choose. Is God primarily a God of love or primarily a God of justice? Of course, the two can't be totally separated. Love demands justice, and justice flows from a sense of love. The challenge is that while the two cannot be separated, neither can they be held as equals. Must God's justice be satisfied by punishment as in the penal substitutionary view of atonement? Or does God suspend judgment and forgive humans out of love by grace? Pastor Mary Gay preaches, "Love or Justice?"

March 21 Eth Sunday in Lant John 12:20

March 21 – 5th Sunday in Lent <u>John 12:20-33</u>

Following Jesus is a matter of life and death. In other words, life and death are of central concern to followers of Jesus. In Lent we follow Jesus all the way to the cross. It is there, in the face of the world's many ways of death (the pandemic, poverty, racism, economic collapse, hunger, sickness, refugees and war) that we are drawn close to Jesus? Paradoxically, in the light of death we catch a glimpse of life at its fullest. Pastor Rich preaches, "A Matter of Life and Death."

March 28 – Palm/Passion Sunday Selected verses from Mark 11, 14 and 15

We begin with Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem as he is greeted by a welcoming crowd, but his supporters abandon him one by one in the week leading to the cross. What does the Gospel of Mark say is the reason for Jesus' death? Was it taken or was it given? How could this happen? Pastor Becky preaches, "Why?"

UMCG Health Team Update

The UMCG Health Team has continued to meet every 2 weeks to review the current state of the pandemic in Kane County: we are updating the reopening criteria, as well as the NIC Absolute Guidelines Checklist in order to be ready should the conditions in Kane County improve to the point that we can open the church building for worship. Currently, Kane County is experiencing a significant improvement in the overall Covid-19 virus statistics and it's COVID risk level has improved to orange per the <u>CovidActNow</u> website. While this is not at a level that allows us to reopen for worship, it is moving in the right direction!

The Health Team will continue to meet on a regular basis and review the reopening criteria against the current conditions in Kane County and Illinois, as well as actively working the NIC Absolute Guidelines checklist to ensure that when the pandemic conditions warrant reopening that we will be ready. In the meantime, we hope that everyone will stay vigilant in taking the precautions necessary to be safe and well!



You can still start... Reading the Gospels During Lent 2021 The Reading Plan - by Jim Byrne

Once again UMCG is encouraging everyone to read the Gospels during Lent. Moreover, everyone is encouraged to respond to the challenge Jesus gave the Apostles: "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation" (Mark 16:15). Invite

your relatives and friends to join in this important act of spiritual renewal and growth. Use e-mail, social media, the telephone, and even postal mail to send them copies of the reading program or to direct them to the UMCG Website where the program is posted. Form a reading group or recruit a reading buddy with whom you can share the reading experience. Links to the reading for each day are <u>here</u>.

The following reading plan is offered as a guide to enriching your Lenten experience. Before you begin reading each day, **prepare** by clearing your mind of the distraction in your life so that you can focus totally on the Bible passage. **Read** silently or aloud with both mind and heart open to the message. When you finish, **reflect** on what you have read, on how it relates to other passages in the Bible, and on how it relates to your life. **Share** what you have read and your reactions with family, a "reading buddy," or a reading or study group with whom you enjoy fellowship face-to-face, by telephone, or by e-mail, Facebook or other social media. Most importantly, **pray** to God in thanksgiving and supplication, and **listen** in silence for God's voice.

Ministry Architects/Renovation Team Report

This past year has brought about many changes and challenges for the church, but the Youth and Children's Ministries have been able to overcome this adversity and grow even during these difficult times. A large part of this development is due to Ministry Architects, the Renovation Team, and the wonderful support of the Church community.

Our work began in June 2020, delayed for a few months by the passing of Jodi Borger and the Pandemic, as the Renovation Team met with Ministry Architects (MA) to discuss the future of the Youth and Children's Ministries. During our monthly meetings we addressed the challenges in our programs and started to complete tasks to lay the foundation we wanted to build on. Ministry Architects is a very structured organization - each task we do builds on the previous one which in the end strengthens, organizes, and improves the efficiency within our programs. For example, one main point that was noted during the listening session was volunteer burnout. To fix that problem, we utilized a 6-step plan created by MA to recruit a list of 70+ volunteers. From there, we compiled their information into a database so we could have a variety of different people to call on for events and activities.

Some other tasks that we have already completed are:

- Revised job descriptions for staff and volunteers
- Discussed volunteer training plans that will take place once in-person events can resume
- Searched through the Elexio database for all families with children and youth in our membership and had Children's and Youth Council reach out to every family
- Conducted monthly coaching calls with the Children's and Youth Directors to discuss ideas and schedules for future events.

Completing just these tasks alone has already resulted in our largest attended events in the past few years. In addition to these tasks, we recently held a Vision Summit led by MA where we discussed our concerns, hopes, and desires for the Youth and Children's Ministries. With over 20+ families participating (with and without children and youth), we were able to get valuable feedback about the future direction of these programs. With this input, we created a Mission Statement, Core Values, and 3-year goals for the programs which will be presented at the upcoming Church Council meeting.

What's next? The Renovation Team will continue to meet monthly with MA to complete more of our tasks. The next large event will be the Christian Foundation Summit which will be conducted this summer to discuss and help plan the learning objectives of each age level and how these might be accomplished utilizing curriculum, milestones, and special programming.

We have already seen great things starting to happen in the Youth and Children's Ministries and thanks to your continued support, this vital ministry will continue to grow and develop as the year progresses.
