On April 25th we will be celebrating Earth Sunday.

Earth Day was started in 1970 as people became more aware of the link between pollution and public health. Groups that had been fighting individually against oil spills, polluting factories and power plants, raw sewage, toxic dumps, pesticides, freeways, the loss of wilderness and the extinction of wildlife united on Earth Day around these shared common values. It led to the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency and many acts that would protect humans from disease and death and hundreds of species of animals from extinction. (earthday.org )

## Pastor Rich Darr Leads Study: The Mission of the Church & Care of Creation: A Discussion Sundays, 6-7:00 p.m., April 18 - May 23 via ZOOM

Each week, class members will discuss an important article or a chapter from Pastor Rich's dissertation on Christian mission and creation care.

#### Schedule:

**April 18**: Article, "The Historical Roots of our Ecological Crisis" by Lynn White, Jr. White's article exploded like a bombshell in religious circles as it laid blame for the modern environmental crisis squarely at the feet of the Judeo-Christian scriptures and traditions. What are the major issues? How did this article impact the rise of eco-theology and the greening of religion and the church?

**April 25:** Article, "The Origins of Western Environmentalism," by Richard Grove Grove argues convincingly that the origins of the modern environmental movement emerged from the margins of Western Empire in the 17th and 18th centuries, including grave concern over climate change due to deforestation and soil erosion. Missionaries on the colonial periphery played an important role in the emergence of the modern environmental movement.

**May 2:** Article, "Historical Trends in Mission and Earth Care," by Dana Robert. The author, first reader of Pastor Rich's dissertation, offers an historical overview of the church's understanding of mission in relation to earth care from the early church through today. She draws on Pastor Rich's dissertation to explicate aspects of missions and creation care in the modern period (19th-21st centuries).

**May 9:** Missionaries: Heroes or Villains of Creation Care? (The case of Southern Africa.) "Introduction to Protestant Missions and Earth-keeping in Southern Africa," Chapter 1 of Pastor Rich's dissertation puts the discussion of the role of missionaries and conservation in the context of two recent theoretical perspectives. Environmental historian Richard Grove sees 19th century missionaries as heroes, forerunners of the modern environmental movement, while anthropologists John and Jean Comaroff portray these same missionaries as villains, harbingers of western imperial domination.

**May 16:** "Robert Moffat: 'God's Gardener.'" Chapter 2 of Pastor Rich's dissertation. Missionary Moffat arrived in Britain's Cape Colony in 1817. His work among the Bechuana tribe is legendary in mission circles. By the mid-1800s his writings to Britain's Royal Geographical Society recognized the relationship between deforestation and climate change in Southern Africa. Moffat also fought to combine improved agriculture in Africa with the eradication of the slave trade.

**May 23:** "John Croumbie Brown: Missionary, Colonial Botanist and Environmental Activist." Chapter 3 of Pastor Rich's dissertation. Environmental historian Richard Grove goes so far as to suggest that Brown was the single most influential voice in the 19th century western environmental movement. A trained botanist, J. C. Brown combined his scientific training with his evangelical fervor to develop an "environmental gospel" that echoed around the world, impacting the rise of modern forestry including the United States' Forestry Service.

### April 2 – Good Friday – Tenebrae Service 7:00 p.m. online and viewable after.

A Service of Tenebrae, or Shadows, is based on a twelfth–century late night/early morning service and is an extended meditation on the passion of Christ. Through readings and music we recall Jesus' arrest, trial, crucifixion, and death, and what it means for the redemption of the world.

### April 4 – Easter Sunday/Holy Communion John 20:1-18

On Easter morning, we find Mary Magdalene at Jesus' tomb. The empty tomb, however, does not prod Mary Magdalene to faith, prompting her instead to anxiety and grief. What happened to Jesus' body? And why did he have to die such a cruel death? Suddenly Mary's closed world breaks open—when Jesus calls her by name. Something illogical, impossible, even unnatural occurs. The old, established rules of what can happen and how are overthrown. Jesus' voice shatters that old world and opens up a brand new future that moves Mary Magdalene, and us, to joy and service.

#### Pastor Rich preaches, "From Tears to Joy. From Sorrow to Service."

#### April 11 – Second Sunday of Easter John 20:19-31

We have here a story about frightened disciples hiding behind locked doors and Thomas who misses the first appearance of Jesus, and doubts Jesus' return. Thomas has questions and is not satisfied with second-hand reports and wants to see for himself. Our question is, can we make room for the "Thomas" in our own lives and in others? Thomas does come to believe, but only after he has a chance to voice his doubt and test his faith. Sometimes faith is like that. True, vigorous, vibrant faith comes from the freedom to question, wonder, and doubt.

#### Pastor Lisa preaches, "Making Room for Thomas."

### April 18 – Third Sunday of Easter Luke 24:36-48

How should we do church? Jesus' walk to Emmaus with his two disciples offers us a pattern to follow: Meet people where they are. Open up the Scriptures so that they can make sense of their lives in light of God's love and mercy. Gather them to Jesus' open table that they might see and be nourished by Christ's presence. And send them on their way, back into the world to partner in Christ's work and to share God's love.\*

#### Pastor Rich preaches, "Doing Church Like Jesus."

### April 25 – Fourth Sunday of Easter/Earth Day Celebration John 10:11-18; Colossians 1:15-20

Jesus offers abundant life – not just for humans but the entire creation! That phrase "abundant life" captures what most of us long for. Not just more life, but abundant life. Not just more stuff, more money, more status and power, but life — real, satisfying, purpose-filled life. This is why Jesus, the good shepherd lay down his life. Today's Earth Day celebration powerfully reminds us that abundant life comes from a life following Jesus, focused on serving others and God's good creation.

Our 2021 finances are not yet perfect, but there are encouraging developments. We have also been able to trim our 2021 budget by several thousand dollars, thanks to a favorable decision by the conference to reduce our apportionments.

Around the conference UMCG is known as one of the strongest mission oriented churches in Illinois. Our wonderful ministries and mission work continue to stay strong, thanks to your faithful support. We are grateful for every dollar you give, and we're working hard to make them accomplish more than ever.

## Our Apportionment Dollars at Work: What is Africa University?

In 1898 Methodist Bishop Joseph Hartzell dreamed of training African teachers to teach African children and helped establish a primary school at "Old Hutare Mission" in the former Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe). In time a hospital, orphanage, and agricultural program were also established.

Over the years desire for an institution of higher learning grew in Zimbabwe, and in 1988 the **General Conference** of United Methodists approved plans to begin a university. By 1992 Africa University had opened its doors, today offering 3 colleges serving 1200 students from 36 countries across Africa.



#### How do we at UMCG support Africa University? We do it through our "apportionment" dollars.

Funding for Africa University is a multi-million dollar, on-going international effort. World Service Special Gifts go toward a permanent endowment, providing scholarships and dollars for new programming.

Another ten million in support is "apportioned" in four-year cycles to the 34,000+ United Methodist churches worldwide. These dollars provide for the day-to-day operating expenses of AU.

Each year since 1992 a portion of UMCG's apportionment dollars has gone to the university. In 2021 we will continue that support with part of the \$5,000 we give to the World Service Fund and an additional \$200 that goes directly to the Africa University operational budget.

"Apportionments" are one of the important ways we support not only our own conference, but missions around the world. What a privilege we have to be a part of that!
