#### NEITHER HERE NOR THERE.

Perhaps you are familiar with the term liminality or liminal space.

The word liminal comes from the Latin word 'limen', meaning threshold – any point or place of entering or beginning. A liminal space is the time between the 'what was' and the 'next.' It is a place of transition, a season of waiting, and not knowing. Richard Rohr describes this space as: "where we are betwixt and between the familiar and the completely unknown. There alone is our old world left behind, while we are not yet sure of the new existence. That's a good space where genuine newness can begin. Get there often and stay as long as you can by whatever means possible...This is the sacred space where the old world is able to fall apart, and a bigger world is revealed." If we don't encounter liminal space in our lives, we start idealizing normalcy.

These thresholds of waiting and not knowing our 'next' are inevitable and most are incredibly disruptive.<sup>1</sup>

I'm in a season of acute liminality. I'm officially UMCG's senior pastor, but I don't fully start until August 1st. I'm not pastoring in Rochelle either. Pastor Rich has moved on to retirement and so there is this gap (which Pastors Lisa and Mary Gay have under control). When this comes out it's likely my family is living one of the great-American road trips to Yellowstone and Glacier National Parks but have not yet made a home.

We're in liminal space with the pandemic, too. Vaccinations are out, but not for everyone. Some normalcy has returned to some parts of our lives but not entirely. The future of the church, our state, nation,

planet all of it isn't clear or certain. The way I see it we are all in in layers and layers in liminal space. Living in this space can be like the trapeze. Free falling after having let go of the old while the new is not yet in reach. I don't know about you, but this can be anxiety producing. Perhaps that is one reason why our world is so tense and has been (and probably will be) for a while.

But like Rohr has quoted above, liminal space is sacred space, even with the accompanying anxiety. Liminal space is something God uses to reshape us into the people God desires us to be. I think a lot about the Israelites and their 40-year journey in the wilderness as a grand story of liminal space. The exodus journey was a time formation and reformation. Some hated it and wanted to go back to Egypt instead of persisting in the unknowing for the Promised Land. I'm sure some settled in the towns along the way. Some didn't make it at all. Why didn't God set the Israelites on a direct path to the Promised Land? I think the wilderness journey wasn't as much about getting the Israelites out of Egypt, it was getting the Egypt out of the Israelites (I think this idea comes from Walter Brueggman, but I can't find the exact quote).

In this liminal season for us as a church, I look to God. Where is God going to call us to move, or be or become in this space? I think that about myself as your new senior pastor. I can't be the old associate pastor you once knew but now in a different office. God's changed me too much to go back. I wonder about ministry in our pandemic-post-Christian context. We can't go back to what worked 30 years ago in Geneva. God has changed UMCG too much.

One calling we have in this liminal season is to wait patiently upon the Lord and be faithful to where the Spirit moves. This can be like watching in the wilderness for the pillar of cloud and fire. So, while we are neither here nor there; join me in praying that God makes good use of us and this uncomfortable gift of liminal space.

My family and I look forward to being with you fully in ministry starting August 1st.

# Small Group Spotlight



#### Men's Early Bird Fellowship

When new church member John Kemble, in 2005, asked Pastor Bill Obalil if there was a men's group that met weekly, he was informed there was none, but if it was important he should start one! John had been in such a group over the last 30 years at previous churches. Since it was important to him, he asked some other men to join him for a breakfast meeting. The premise of the meeting was a study of a Christian author's book at an early morning time that would allow both retired and still-working men to enjoy fellowship and breakfast. Keith Bowgren, Jim McConnell, John Fasbender, Jules Heinemann and Bill Knott were among the first joiners of the group. Colonial Restaurant on IL Route 38 was the meeting place.

The meetings start with discussion of the current book for about an hour, followed by breakfast. The only commitments required are to obtain the study book and show up occasionally. One member of the group, often Jim or John, will lead the discussion.

Selection of study book is done by mutual consent. Often a book by a well-known pastor is chosen, or a study of a book of the Bible. Attendance has varied but normally eight to twelve men show up.
