PASTOR'S MESSAGE

BACK TO SCHOOL SEASON

I have always found the back-to-school season a mixed bag of emotions. I find that there is something exciting and energizing about the new school year. A chance to try new things, meet new people, find a new daily rhythm, learn new concepts and ideas. When focused on



these emotions I recall Revelation 21:5 "See, I am making all things new." I also experience grief in this season. The loss of the freedom of summer. If I didn't accomplish all that I had envisioned in the spring, those are losses. The fond memories and relationships from the year prior that may not be there are mourned as well. When I feel this loss I remember the words of the Psalms "The Lord is near to the brokenhearted, and saves the crushed in spirit." (Psalm 34:18 NRSV). Then there is anxiety over the uncertainty and unknown of the school year. It was easy for me to worry about classes, doing well and making new friends. This is when Jesus words in Matthew: "So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." (Matt 6:34 NRSV).

I've not been enrolled in school for 14 years now, but after 20 years of education, that emotional pattern still rolls through my life. I experience it most acutely at the start of a new appointment. I'm excited and energized at the prospect of new ministry opportunities, grieving over the loss of a beloved church and that familiar pattern to life, and anxious about how things will play out in this new ministry. Returning to those scriptures can surely be helpful in times like this.

At the close of my first month at UMCG, I do feel this surge of energy. The Holy Spirit is moving and ready to do a new thing in us as a church. I see glimpses of it as we continue to reopen and restart ministries, schedule baptisms and weddings and I meet new people. I do miss Rochelle and the comfort of that familiar pattern of life and ministry. While I am hopeful and confident about what God has in store for us, I'm still anxious about it as God hasn't made all those plans clear yet. So just like in school, I'll wake up each day and put my best self forward as an offering to God to be used

however God sees fit.

My current morning devotion app sometimes gives me a morning prayer that reminds me of the Wesleyan Covenant Prayer that I find centering for seasons like this. I share it here in case it's a blessing to you:

This is another day, O Lord. I know not what it will bring forth, but make me ready, Lord, for whatever it may be. If I am to stand up, help me to stand bravely. If I am to sit still, help me to sit quietly. If I am to lie low, help me to do it patiently. And if I am to do nothing, help me to do it gallantly. Make these words more than words, and give me the Spirit of Jesus. Amen.

BEQUEST ANNOUNCEMENT

A few weeks ago our church received a very generous bequest from the estate of Ruth L. Anderson totaling \$1,472,983.96. Ruth was the widow of Orville T. Anderson. Orville was a St. Charles native and uncle of longtime UMCG members Esther and Mary Bullock. Additionally, a few of Orville's



relatives had a connection to UMCG, and when they died in the 1980s Pastor Larry Hilkemann officiated their funerals.

Ruth died in 2006 at the age of 92 in New Cumberland, Pennsylvania. Upon the recent death of their only child, Richard, three United Methodist churches were surprised and blessed to receive the remainder of the Anderson estate.

Ruth was a graduate of Indian Hills High School, Cincinnati and a graduate of the University of Cincinnati; a member of Baughman Memorial United Methodist Church, New Cumberland, Pennsylvania and she was also an active volunteer for various organizations throughout the greater Harrisburg, PA area. Born in Cincinnati, she was the daughter of the late Benjamin and Louise C.(Heinecke) Lewe.

Esther and Mary did not have a particularly close relationship with Orville and Ruth. Esther recalls that they typically only visited with the Andersons during the holidays because of the distance. Both Orville and Ruth were very social people who faithfully attended their church out east and wanted to leave a legacy gift to United Methodist Churches.

We praise God for her faithfulness, generosity and witness! Following our by-laws concerning undesignated bequests, this generous gift has been equally shared between the Trustees Reserve Fund and the Endowment Fund.

"See All the People" - Series Continues

Jesus' itinerant ministry was all inclusive. Jesus includes those within the religious establishment (and often Jesus was critical of these folks) but Jesus' most generous and loving action and messages were with those outside the religious establishment. Being able to see all the people brought salvation to those who were excluded and invited those established religious folk to new vitality in their relationship with God as the new Kingdom Jesus proclaimed comes on earth as it is in heaven.

September 5 - Pastor Lisa Telomen Preaches, "Guess Who is Coming to Dinner?!" Mark 7:24-37

Jesus has just spent some time healing the sick around Galilee, then is confronted by religious leaders for not following some of the religious traditions and commandments. Jesus crosses into a neighboring region to get away for a bit, but a foreign woman asks for help...Jesus honors her faith and heals her child. Next a deaf man is brought to him. Ponder with Pastor Lisa, how long should our table be?! Do we have to welcome all the guests God sends our way?!

September 12 - Pastor Rob Hamilton Preaches, "Shoo! Get Out of Here!" <u>Mark 10:13-16</u>
Jesus sees the children in the crowd as they try to get close to him. The disciples see them too and try to chase them off. Pastor Rob wonders what is it about finding something so divine we want to hoard it for ourselves? It's almost like we're afraid that there isn't enough Jesus to go around. Jesus knows how to set us straight and show us the endless abundance of God's grace. It's so simple even the kids get it.

September 19 - Pastor Rob Hamilton Preaches, "Regaining Sight" Mark 10:46-52

Too often we might equate ourselves to the crowd in this story. We want to be the ones who have claimed our seat at the curb to see Jesus when he passes by. We don't too often think of ourselves as the ones in need of mercy, because of our 'blindness'. Pastor Rob will push us to question in what ways Jesus might be ready to help us regain sight in his sermon "Regaining Sight".

September 26 - Pastor Rob Hamilton Preaches, "But What About Me?" <u>Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32</u> In all this talk of seeing all the different kinds of people that Jesus sees and helps, what about us? Yes, some people suffer and need healing through no fault of their own, but there are also plenty of people who made their misery, should they get help before the people who do everything right and play by the rules? Perhaps when Pastor Rob preaches on this familiar story it can help shed some light on the question 'what about me?'


Children's Ministry Update

In the Old Testament a piece of wisdom given to shepherds is "Know well the condition of your flocks, and give attention to your herds." (Proverbs 27:23 NRSV)

As shepherds of the flock of UMCG, we strongly desire to provide the UMCG family with emotional, social and spiritual support for those who request it. We, your pastors, want to know the condition of our church and provide sufficient care to all-ages of our flock. To that end, we invite those desiring pastoral care to reach out to any of our pastors for care directly or through the church office.

To help clarify expectations for pastoral care, here is what we want you to know:

Pastor Mary Gay McKinney is our Coordinator of Congregational Care and her typical days to provide care are Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Pastors Rob Hamilton and Lisa Telomen work in coordination with Pastor Mary Gay throughout the week Monday-Thursday. Pastors Rob and Lisa utilize Fridays as their day off but are on-call for emergencies alternating weeks. Pastor Rob is on call 1st and 3rd weeks of the month and Pastor Lisa the 2nd and 4th weeks of the month. When in doubt, reach out to any pastor and they will make sure your need gets

addressed by the pastor on-call.

While each circumstance is unique and requires its own level of care, this is standard by which we seek to provide care once we are informed:

- Emergency, Crisis and Sudden Deaths will be responded to as soon as we are made aware.
- ICU/Critical Care: 1-2 contacts per stay or every other day while in ICU.
- Scheduled Surgeries: A contact before and after surgery.
- In-patient hospitalization: 1 contact per stay or 1 contact per week.
- Long-Term hospitalization: 1 contact per week.
- Rehabilitation: 1 contact per month.
- Long-Term Nursing or Memory Care: 1 contact per quarter.
- Homebound: 1 contact per quarter.

Creation Care

Leave the Leaves!

One of the most valuable things you can do to support pollinators and other invertebrates is to provide them with the winter cover they need in the form of fall leaves and standing dead plant material. The vast majority of butterflies and moths overwinter in the landscape as an egg, caterpillar, chrysalis, or adult using leaf litter for winter cover. Luna moths and swallowtail butterflies disguise their cocoons and chrysalises as dried leaves, blending in with the "real" leaves. At the end of summer, mated queen bumble bees burrow only an inch or two into the earth to hibernate for winter.

An extra thick layer of leaves is welcome protection from the elements. There are so many animals that live in leaves: spiders, snails, worms, beetles, millipedes, mites, and more that support the chipmunks, turtles, birds, and amphibians that rely on these insects for food.

Many organic gardeners opt for shredding their

fall leaves for use in compost piles. While this is certainly a more environmentally friendly practice than bagging leaves and sending them to the



landfill-shredded leaves will not provide the same cover as leaving them whole, and you may be destroying eggs, caterpillars, and chrysalis along with the leaves. Leaves provide valuable organic matter and build up healthy soil. You might rake what you can into your planting beds and use a recycling mower to shred the remaining leaves on your lawn. Be kind to the wildlife that needs leaves for winter protection. Take a break and leave the leaves.

Peace and greetings to you from the Finance Committee.

First, we want to say "Thank You" for all of your support of UMCG ministries this year. It has been a difficult year in many ways, and we realize it has not been easy for many families.

By now you will have received a letter from the church, describing our financial challenge going forward and announcing the launch of a Matching Funds Program. With PPP funds fully used as of June 30, we are working hard to close UMCG's operations funding gap and keep our finances balanced through the end of 2021. With all 170 regular givers pitching in a little extra, according to their means, we can make it happen!

It cannot be said too often: We are extremely grateful for all of your contributions, monetarily and otherwise, to UMCG this year. We are also very grateful for the amazing generosity of Church Council members, who have personally committed over \$13,000 in extra dollars to launch the Matching Funds Program! They definitely are "walking the walk." Finally, we are extremely grateful for the "matching donors" who have contributed another \$10,500 **plus** matching funds of \$8,500 (and growing) to double the impact of extra contributions from the rest of us. Thank you so much!
